Request and Response:

The request is for information that will aid me in a study regarding High-rise incidents and emergency response.

Please would you be able to provide me with the answers and information to the following questions:

• Do you have High-rise structures in your response area, if yes how many and what is the size of the largest structure?

We do not hold this information. There is no official source/s of information for the number of high rise buildings in London. From the information that is available we can approximate that there are around 20,000 buildings in London with an occupied height of over eighteen metres (high rise). Of these, around 5,000 are classed as being for residential use. The London Fire Brigade (LFB) will only hold information on the buildings we have inspected.

• Do you have an operational policy for dealing with high-rise incident, if yes would be able to provide a copy of this information?

As you are probably aware, the Prime Minister has ordered a Public Inquiry into the Grenfell tower fire (https://www.grenfelltowerinquiry.org.uk/). As part of this several LFB policy documents have been made available, including a copy of our 'High Rise Firefighting' policy. • What are your average response times for the first and second fire appliance for the last three years?

- What is your Pre-determined Attendance (PDA) for an incident in a High-rise premise for an unconfirmed and confirmed fire?
- In the last three years have any issues, which hindered Firefighters response at High-rise incidents been recorded/observed? If yes what were the factors involved?
- Since the Grenfell incident in 2017 have you made changes to your PDA for a High-rise incident; confirmed and unconfirmed?
- Since the Grenfell incident in 2017 have you made changes to your policies/procedures regarding Highrise incidents?
- In the last three years have you as a service researched/implemented new tactics or equipment for dealing with high-rise incidents?

Whilst I can confirm that the Brigade does hold further information meeting the parameters of your request (above). Regrettably, this information falls within the scope of the Public inquiry and whilst the Public Inquiry is still being heard and the investigations are still underway, we consider that to release any of this information held in connection to the fire, our operational response or documentation held prior to the fire, is exempt, for now, from the provisions of the Freedom of Information Act 2000 (FOIA).

I am of the view that S31 of the FOIA – 'Law Enforcement' applies to this information and that LFB is therefore not required to disclose it.

The exemption is engaged because release of the information at this time would or would be likely to prejudice:

- 1. The prevention or detection of crime
- 2. The apprehension or prosecution of offenders
- 3. The administration of justice.

I take this view because the release of information which may meet the parameters of this request would or would be likely to prejudice the ongoing police investigation and the Public Inquiry. If we published the information you have requested (and you will understand that providing information to you is effectively putting that information into the public domain) any witness giving evidence to the Public Inquiry may have access to information that they otherwise would not have seen, and that this may impact on any testimony/evidence they give, or are likely to give, to the Public Inquiry. Such an impact may come via information published by, and in the media.

In considering the application of S31, I have considered factors for and against disclosure.

Factors in favour of disclosure: There is arguably a public interest in making available information about the incident and the safety of Grenfell Tower, to inform the public debate on this issue.

Factors against disclosure: (a) It is in the public interest that the Police and other law enforcement agencies can gather information and investigate without fear of information that may be relevant to their investigations being made available to the public before they have been able to complete their investigations. These investigations are still at a very early stage and it is therefore in the public interest to maintain the exemption at this time; (b) It is in the public interest that a Public Inquiry should have the opportunity to consider all information which may be relevant to the terms of reference of that Inquiry, without fear that public authorities will make disclosures of relevant material to the public before an Inquiry has even began; and (c) The information which is withheld is not in the public domain and is particularly sensitive.

It is for the above reasons that I am of the view that any information held which falls within the parameters of your request is exempt from disclosure under S31 FOIA. We do appreciate the public's interest in this incident and the need for transparency about what has happened, but at this time that need is best met if the Police and the Inquiry can conduct their work without the information we hold being compromised.
